Session One: The Continuum of Young Lives

Youth justice is not a single system or structure, it is a constantly shifting jigsaw made up of interconnected parts: education, family, community, policing, courts, social care, and beyond. This session explores the youth justice system as a continuum within the broader trajectory of young people's lives. It recognises that young people move in and out of systems, often unpredictably, and that our responses must be as dynamic and flexible as their realities.

Session Two: Girls, Gender and Justice

Despite making up only a small proportion of those who come into contact with the youth justice system, girls remain consistently overlooked in both policy and practice. In Ireland, girls account for just 13% of referrals to the Garda Youth Diversion Programme, and their numbers in detention are even lower. While the numbers might be low, research has found that girls in the justice system often experience complex layers of marginalisation, trauma, and unmet needs that go unseen and unheard. This session will explore the invisibility of girls in justice discourse, the drivers of their involvement in offending, and the risks of replicating approaches designed primarily for boys.

Session Three: Digital Justice and Online Harm

As young people navigate an increasingly digital world, the youth justice system must evolve to meet new and complex challenges. This session explores how harm, surveillance, and criminalisation can occur invisibly and rapidly in online spaces. We will examine the impact of algorithmic bias in reinforcing stereotypes, the role of recommendation engines in steering youth toward extremism, and the growing threat of AI-driven surveillance to youth privacy. This session offers a vital space to reimagine youth justice in the digital age - one that protects, empowers, and includes young people in shaping a safer online future.



The main Museum entrance is on Military Road. There is also a secondary entrance (Pedestrian only) on South Circular Road, opposite the Courthouse at Kilmainham Gaol.

There is a car park (entrance via Military Road). Please note that if you are entering Dublin via car from the West / N4 / M4 you cannot turn right onto Military Road.

IMMA is an 8 minute walk via Military Road from Heuston Train Station and Luas tram stop. Connolly Station is connected to Heuston Station by the Red Luas line.

You can reach IMMA by taking a <u>bus</u> (145 or C-Spine buses C1,2,3,4) to Heuston Station and then walking 8 minutes to IMMA via the Military Road gate. Or by taking a bus (13, 40, 123, G-Spine G1,2) to St. James's Hospital which is also an 8 minute walk via steps to Bow Lane onto Irwin St. and then Military Rd.
