Mr. Kris Gledhill, University of Auckland, was the keynote speaker with a paper entitled "Mental Disorder and Liability to Punishment: Recent English Developments". From an Irish perspective, Mr. Tom O'Malley, National University of Ireland, Galway, presented his paper "Mental Disorder and Proportionate Punishment" and Ms. Áine Hynes, Irish Mental Health Lawyers Association, presented her paper "Operating The Criminal Law (Insanity) Act: a Legal Practitioner's Perspective". Garda Inspectorate Report - Crime Investigation

The most recent report by the Garda Inspectorate "Crime Investigation" was published on 11th November, 2014. The Inspectorate examined the policies, practices and procedures used in the prevention and investigation of crime. The inspection also included a review of the allocation of Garda resources, the use of technology, the management of caseloads, and monitored the progress of individual investigations. Prison Law by Mary Rogan

In Ireland, prison litigation is becoming increasingly common. Prison numbers are at an all-time high and conditions in many Irish prisons have been criticized by international and domestic human rights bodies, such as the Irish Penal Reform Trust and the Inspector of Prisons, who have voiced concern about the lack of accountability for decisions taken by prison administrators on issues such as discipline, transfers, and release. The rights of prisoners are a key focus of the book. These rights are examined in relation to prison conditions, contact with the outside world, discipline, remission, transfer, and release.

Developments in other Jurisdictions

In England and Wales, the Department of Education has recently announced the funding of a national unit to extend the Family Drug and Alcohol Court model nationwide. The unit will work with a range of practitioners and academic institutions, who are coming together to help set up sites in new areas thereby extending this vital service to vulnerable families.

The Family Drug and Alcohol court is rooted in the idea of problem-solving justice, where courts use their authority to address the complex social issues that bring people before them. It is run by specially-trained and dedicated judges who provide direct, ongoing supervision and support to parents in recovery. They work closely with a multi-disciplinary team who offer personalised care and treatment to families at risk. The Court works with parents, social workers and substance misuse professionals to combat addictions in families and, where possible, keep them together. Where this isn't possible, the Court aims to make swift decisions in order to find children a permanent loving, stable home with minimal disruption.

A recent evaluation report concluded that families going through FDAC are more likely to stay together, that parents are more likely to reduce their drug use, and that the children going through FDAC are less likely to experience further neglect and abuse than similar families passing through mainstream family courts.

FDAC is one of the most successful examples of problem-solving court innovation in England and Wales in recent years.


"Youth Justice Transformation" Report Launch
